Set purpose: Knowing what you know about these animals, what advantages does a hare have over a tortoise? What advantages does a tortoise have over a hare? Let's read to find out if the author has included any of our information!

The Hare and the Tortoise

Remember! Use examples or descriptions to help students come up with a "kid" definition!

Kid definition: how fast he can go
